Kurt's Corner

The word "lent" comes from an ancient word that meant "springtime," that period of the calendar during which the days lengthen. Because the church season always fell at that time of year, the name came to apply there as well. Even after the word "lent" no longer referred to spring, it was still used by the church to describe the season before Easter.

As you know, the season of Lent as currently observed lasts forty days, Ash Wednesday until Easter. The early church celebrated Lent only for a few days before Easter, but, over the centuries, the season grew until it was several weeks long. In the seventh century, the church set the period of Lent at forty days to remind people of the duration of Jesus' temptation in the wilderness. If you go to your calendar and actually count the number of days between Ash Wednesday and Easter, you total 46. Why the discrepancy? The Sundays during Lent are not counted.

"Giving up something for Lent" was a discipline that grew out of the church's preparation for membership. Since Lent was traditionally a time of fasting, the day before it began was always one during which people would use up eggs, butter, and other perishables that would not last through the Lenten season, and "Fat Tuesday" was celebrated with many traditional and tasty baked goods. Then would come Ash Wednesday; no more goodies till Easter.

What does Lent mean for us today? Yes, it is still the church season in which we prepare for Easter Sunday. It is a special time of prayer and reflection, of confession and self-denial. As Bill Reel, a newspaper columnist for the New York Daily news and a Catholic, described it, Lent is "an excuse to be better." I like that idea.

What will Lent 2012 mean for you? The decision is yours. May I offer a few suggestions? In the tradition of "giving up" something for Lent, how about some of these (you might have heard these before, but they bear repeating):

Planning Sessions

On January 22, we held the first of two Planning Sessions. During this time we focused upon Mt. Zion's history and examined our church's DNA. We talked about our high and low points of church attendance, recalled significant events, and remembered influential ministers. We discussed our strengths and weaknesses as well as our challenges and threats. We talked about our community and its demographics and thought about the needs of the community and what we felt God is calling us to do.

On February 5, we held another Planning Session which was future-focused. After a delicious breakfast furnished for the whole church (thank you Men's Group!), we set goals for the coming five years including a vision for worship attendance and missions. We settled on the following goals:

1. Expanding the small group offerings for adults with the immediate start of a second adult Sunday School class.
2. Strengthen the children's Sunday School program by enlisting team teachers and recruiting substitute teachers.
3. Putting renewed energy into the youth Sunday School class by seeking out new leaders to start the class back up.
4. Making strategic efforts to get the word out about our church (website, mass mailings, etc).
5. Expand our parking lot capability (What a great problem to have!).

Thank you to everyone who attended and gave your input. Mt. Zion is an amazing church and I am so honored to be your pastor!

- Give up grumbling. Instead, remember “in everything give thanks”. Constructive criticism is alright, but moaning, groaning, and complaining are not the marks of a Christian.

- Give up your hatred of anyone or anything. Instead, learn the discipline of love. Love does cover a multitude of sins.
- Give up your worries and anxieties. Instead, trust God with them. Anxiety is spending emotional energy on something we can do nothing about...like tomorrow! Live for today and let God's grace be sufficient.
- Give up TV one evening a week. Instead, visit someone who is lonely or sick. There are those who are isolated by illness or age. Give someone a precious gift, your time.
- Give up buying anything but essentials for yourself. Instead, give the money to God. The money you would spend on the luxuries could help someone meet their basic needs. We are called to be stewards of God's resources, not consumers.

It's not a long list. I am sure you can think of other things to add. Let's all take Lent 2012 as an excuse to be better.

Administrative Council Meeting on Sunday, **March 4**, 2012 at 7:15 p.m.

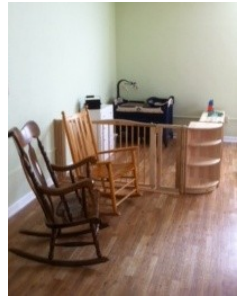
Daylight Saving Time begins 2AM, Sunday, **March 11**, 2012.

A Tribute To Jack & Helen Wilson

Word has been received of the passing of Jack Wilson. His wife, Helen died August 29, 2007 from lung cancer.

Last October 16th, Dr. McPherson's sermon topic was "The Third Commitment: Serve". In his list of reasons to serve (the church) was included: serve because of love. Jack and Helen Wilson illustrated that. The preacher also said, service and faith go together. If you attended Mount Zion in the 1990's...several years before and a couple of years later, you remember this couple. But, if you weren't here then, their presence at Mount Zion can still be seen and / or felt.

One of them probably served at some time on every committee that existed at Mount Zion. Helen was active in the United Methodist Women, became Lay Representative to Annual Conference in 2000, served as a secretary to the Administrative Council several years, and was Senior Adult Leader when the RAPpers (Really Adult People) was formed. She made curtains, tablecloths and the skirt for the Chrismon Tree. Miriam Coffman remembers that Jack built the huge cornice board that is the window covering in the pastor's study. Miriam and Helen covered it with the fabric that you currently see. Jack was active in the Men's Club, served as church treasurer for several years, was chair of the Building Committee in the late 1990's and chair of the Trustees at the time of major renovations at Mount Zion. He was very concerned about handicap accessibility and the parking lot improvements at that time included the addition of handicap parking spaces. The grab bar that you see at the steps near the piano was put there by Jack.

Outside the church, Jack was involved in Rotary and both he and Helen were volunteers at Oconee Hospital. Helen was active in the Old Ninety-Six Girl Scouts Council. Jack and Helen downsized to a home at Wesley Commons (formerly The Methodist Home) in Greenwood, SC in 2001. They were a joy to work with. Thanks to all of you who "love" God, Mount Zion and "served" with them during that time.

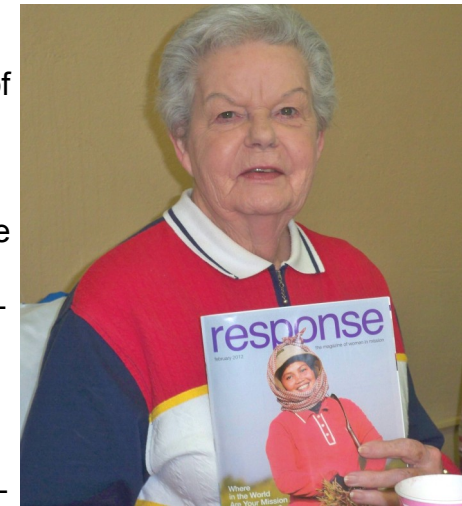
