After some minutes, the pastor took the fire tongs, carefully picked up a brightly burning ember and placed it to one side of the hearth all alone then he sat back in his chair, still silent.

The host watched all this in quiet contemplation. As the one lone ember's flame flickered and diminished, there was a momentary glow and then its fire was no more. Soon it was cold and dead.

Not a word had been spoken since the initial greeting. The pastor glanced at his watch and realized it was time to leave. He slowly stood up, picked up the cold, dead ember and placed it back in the middle of the fire. Immediately it began to glow, once more with the light and warmth of the burning coals around it.

As the pastor reached the door to leave, his host said with a tear running down his cheek, "Thank you so much for your visit and especially for the fiery sermon. I will be back in church next Sunday."

Let us not forsake the importance of meeting together and encouraging one another. Make it your frequent habit this new year.

Parsonage Remodel

You may have heard that a remodel of Mt. Zion's parsonage kitchen and den is in process. Our current parsonage was built in 1971 when my father-inlaw, Rev. Donald R. O'Dell, was pastor at Mt. Zion. The property that it was built on was donated by the late Leland Brock. The late Glenn Carson and R. B. Smith presided over the planning and building of the parsonage. Catherine Carson and the late Sara Clayton played a major part in the decoration of the parsonage's interior. Bishop Paul Hardin presided over a consecration ceremony on November 7, 1971 with an open house following the ceremony.

The parsonage is spacious with a huge basement. We have been blessed that our parsonage has been so well maintained and still functions quite well for the families that live there. The kitchen, though, was due for some updating, especially the cabinets.

On December 27, we will gut the kitchen to the studs. New sheetrock and cabinets will be installed. The cabinets are made with all plywood construction and solid maple fronts. They will also have some organizational features to maximize the space. New vinyl flooring and laminate countertops will be installed. A deep-welled sink and new faucet will finish out the countertops. Canned and under-the-counter lighting will brighten the kitchen and give more balanced lighting to the space. The den paneling and trim will be painted the same color as the kitchen uniting the two rooms.

We are really exicted about this project. We feel that it will add to the livability and functionality of the parsonage. We also appreciate the patience that Kurt and Lillie have shown with the inconvenience that this project has entailed.

If you should decide that you would like to help defray the cost of this project, you can make an additional donation by designating that it is for the parsonage remodeling.


Clemson Community Care (CCC)
