I never really know how to respond other than, “he is progressing.” That statement is true, but it is not all encompassing. I am realizing more and more what that progression is leading to. I struggle with wanting my dad around even if he can’t really communicate or know who I am. I also don’t want for him or my mom to suffer anymore. Dad is in what they call the late stages of Alzheimer’s. I don’t know how long dad has on this earth, but I know it is coming to an end, whenever that is. It is hard to watch and hard to talk about without tears. The one thing that I cling to is knowing where dad is going. I know that soon he will have full memory. He will be reunited with loved ones. And one day he will be waiting for the rest of us. My faith and the faith of my father gives me this hope and assurance.

Faith is defined as having complete trust or confidence in someone or something. Hebrews tells us that, “faith is the substance of things hoped for and the evidence of things not seen.” I have faith that even in the midst of all this pain and struggle that I have that God is still there and God can still bring good out of any situation. As I have said before I do not believe that God gave my dad Alzheimer’s, but I do believe that God can bring some moments of beauty out of this ugly disease.





Report on Annual Conference from John Malmgren

It was indeed a privilege and honor to represent Mt. Zion at the SC United Methodist Annual Conference in Greenville June 3-6, 2018. The theme of the conference was “A More Excellent Way.” As usual, our Bishop, L. Jonathan Holston, and Conference Secretary kept the meeting moving along; however, the 2019 conference will have an extra day added. The extra day is to allow for voting for representatives, both lay and clergy, to the 2020 General and Jurisdictional Conferences. Also, the 2019 conference will be dealing with the outcomes of the 2019 called General Conference which is discussing LGBTQ marriage and ordination within the scope of United Methodism.

As usual, Sunday evening consists of dinner and a worship service.

The business of the conference begins Monday morning through Wednesday. The business sessions consist of committee reports and voting on proposed resolutions. Additionally, there are other annual services: ordination of new pastors, missions celebration, service for retiring ministers, and a memorial service for ministers and spouses who have passed away in the last year.


There were no real controversial resolutions dealt with this year. The ones involving LGBTQ issues were tabled to be discussed after the 2019 called General Conference. In addition, there were morning communion services, Bible studies, and evening worship services each day.

The finances of the conference (pensions, health benefits, and budget) are also discussed at length. The cost of health benefits and pensions are only increasing slightly this year due to good budgeting on the part of the conference. The conference budget also has a slight increase, but it is less than 2%.

The final result of the conference is a “good feeling” about our denomination.

The Water Day will start at **4:00p.m.** with the Tailgate starting at **5:00p.m.** We invite you to bring some chairs and join us as we tailgate in the parking lot and field behind the church. We also encourage you to invite others to come and join us for this fun time together.



Our weekly Bible Study will begin back on **Tuesday September 11th at 6:30p.m.** at the parsonage. This is a great time to join us if you have been thinking about it. On **Sunday September 2nd** we will have our annual Labor Day hymn sing. We hope you will enjoy singing the great hymns of our faith.



There is a song by a couple of artists named Shane and Shane called *Beauty For Ashes*. In the song it says, “Beauty for ashes. A garment of praise for my heaviness. Beauty for ashes. Take this heart of stone and make it Yours. I delight myself in the Riches of Fare. Trading all that I've had for all that is better. A garment of praise for my heaviness.” The idea for the song comes from Isaiah 61:3 where we are told that those who mourn will be given beauty or a garland instead of ashes. One of the writers of the song wrote this song after losing his sister. This is the hope that I am clinging on to and that is the hope I think we all should be clinging on to. That God will give us beauty even in the midst of ashes.

I am not here to tell you that I always see beauty in the midst of ashes. Sometimes the ashes are piled high around, and beauty becomes hard to see. Sometimes I struggle with seeing God in this disease that has robbed my dad of his memories. But, even when the ashes are piled high we can catch even just a glimpse of beauty and that is what we have to hold on to. For me it is a moment when he smiles and tells me he loves me or when he is awake and just has the slightest glimmer in his eyes.

I am reading a book right now about leadership and organizations. The book talks about how organizations need to restructure themselves based on collaboration and following the model of ecosystems where everything is interdependent. One of the assumptions is that given the chance, people will choose to be interdependent and help one another. I see that when people stop to ask me how my dad is. We can see that in church. We can see that in times of disasters. We can see that in times of suffering. We can see that more and more in everyday life if we begin to look for the beauty even in the midst of the ashes. We are able to help one another through the tough times in life to help bring the beauty that God has waiting for us.

May we each find beauty in everyday life. May we each find beauty in the midst of ashes. May this beauty lead us to hope, and hope lead us to faith. May we find the evidence of the things unseen.
