

Pastor Jim's W.I.R.E.D. Thoughts

Who is this Jesus that people claim was God in the flesh, who walked upon the earth teaching and healing and causing a stir among religious, political and common people in the first century Middle East? Who is this Jesus that, through His words and actions and very life and death impacted the history of the world and is credited for transforming lives over the centuries? Do we really know who this Jesus was and is?

These questions, and many more, will be some of the topics of discussion during a six-week look at the life and ministry of Jesus, beginning on **Tuesday**, **March 4 at 6:30-7:30 pm** and meeting at the **Main Street Deli & Coffeehouse in Central.** The study is based on the book, "The Jesus I Never Knew" by Philip Yancey, who strips away the layers of church tradition from the picture we often have of Jesus, and gives us a look at how His ministry must have looked to the people of first-century Palestine. Through these fresh eyes, we are challenged to re-evaluate our relationship to this man who claimed He was sent by God and our relationship to Him. This DVD/book study will allow people to come to a fresh understanding of Jesus' work among the people of His day, and how He continues to work among us today.

From the Worship Committee:

On Sunday, February 2nd, three beautiful **silver chalices** were dedicated and used in the communion service that followed. Each was donated by a member of the congregation in memory of a special member of the Mt. Zion family. Vicki Miesbauer honored her husband, Steve Miesbauer. Jan Miller honored



her good friend, Beverly Smith. And Gail Wingard honored her fellow chorister, Betty Walters. These chalices will be used whenever communion is served by intinction, a method of taking communion by dipping the bread into the juice. The Worship Committee voted last year to serve by this method for the Christmas Eve service and any other specially designated times during the year.

There are **no flowers** in the sanctuary during Lent. It is a time of selfexamination, reflection, and repentance. On Easter Sunday, worshipers are asked to bring flowers from their yard to place on the large cross which will be in the sanctuary. Information is forthcoming in the church bulletin for individuals wishing to purchase an Easter Lily in memory or honor of someone. These lilies will be placed in the sanctuary on Easter Sunday and available for pickup after the service.

The South Carolina Conference UMC has a God sized dream to collect 1,000,000 (1 Million) NEW, age-appropriate books for pre-school and elementary school children by June 3rd, 2014 (Tuesday of Annual Conference).

- This breaks down to roughly 83,500 books per District and roughly 1,000 books per church.

In addition we will have a celebratory worship service Tuesday Night at Annual Conference that is focused on youth and young adults. We would love to see you at this service to help us celebrate! More information will be coming soon, so please keep checking back.

Why are we doing it?

Illiteracy and poverty often go hand-in-hand. As Christians, it is our responsibility to care for those most in need among us. We will transform the lives of children in our state by equipping them with the tools they need to grow into educated adults.

How will we do it?

Each District Connectional Ministries (DCM) will be responsible for identifying school districts, agencies, and literacy and children's programs within their districts to receive the books.

On June 3rd, 2014 we will collect the books at the Florence Civic Center as well as 3 other collection points around the state. That day volunteers will receive, sort, package, and place bookplates in each book to prepare them for distribution.

What should you do?

- Talk to your UMW, UMM, Sunday School classes and other groups within your church about the project.
- Invite businesses, individuals and other churches within your community to be involved.

• Go ahead and start collecting new, age-appropriate books for pre-school and elementary school children.

• Plan to volunteer at one of the 4 collection sites on Tuesday, June 3rd, 2014.

• Consider additional ways that your church can combat illiteracy and poverty in your community.

• Pray for our Conference and the children we hope to impact.

Our goals are lofty, but not unattainable. We need your help to realize this vision. At Mt. Zion, a box will be located in the sanctuary near the credenza for book donations. Thank You!!

Beverly's family and Guild members remembered Beverly and her loving dedication to Mt. Zion United Methodist Church.

I am so pleased that we get to remember and honor our special friend, Beverly Smith. I want to share a little about Beverly and I thank Laura for helping me remember all that Beverly was involved with during her life. As many of you, I met Beverly at Mt. Zion. We first met in the nursery on Laura's christening day and that is the reason I continue to keep the nursery today. We got to know each other through the Mattie Mae Allen Circle. I say this to let you all know that Mt. Zion was the foundation of our friendship. But most importantly, I want you to know that Beverly loved this church.

If you didn't get the chance to meet Beverly, you should know that she was an amazing and beautiful woman. She cared deeply about her husband, Neil and precious daughter, Laura as well as her brother, sisters, and cousins. And she loved her friends as family, too. I cannot imagine how proud she would be of her grandson, Jaxon. Laura said it best when she said "she would have been a cool grandma." As I looked at Jaxon's one year old picture shoot I could hear Beverly's infectious laugh. It makes me sad that he does not get to know her as a grandson should know a grandmother. But I have no doubt that he will learn to love her because her family keeps her memory alive.

Beverly was a dynamic woman. She was the type of person that could just at ease with a homeless person as with a country music star or a national political leader. She fit in no matter where she was or who she was with. From baking brownies for a group of unwed mothers, spreading mulch with the landscapers, hanging out with Vince Gill or having dinner with governors and congressmen, Beverly made everyone feel special. I have often thought that this church kept her in touch with her roots. She grew up about a mile from the church.

As I said Beverly loved Mt. Zion. If there was a need or job to do, Beverly was right on it. When Jan Grubbs decided to move on from Sunday school teacher, Beverly was quick to step in. She then accepted the duties of worship committee chairperson. She spearheaded the renovations/updates that were made to the church in the 1990s. She was so proud of the social hall and restroom and how much nicer those areas looked. No project was too large for Beverly. She also took on the role of the "official brass polisher" in the sanctuary. She really took pride in our beautiful sanctuary. You could always tell how much Beverly loved this church by her attention to the details. She also served as communion steward and was a member of the Trustees at Mt. Zion. Her contributions to this church were based on her love for Mt. Zion and her commitment to always get the job done.

Beverly dearly loved the children of Mt Zion and would always accompany them on various outings. She enjoyed spending time with our youth group and chaperoning the Youth conference and ski trip. She was so much fun to be around and so adventurous.

Beverly was also very concerned about her community. She was involved in the Wings program. WINGS is a program designed to provide support to women in overcoming obstacles, building healthy relationships, parenting effectively, building life skills and personal independence. On the day she went to the hospital, she had been preparing snacks and gathering items such as diapers, wipes, and other baby necessities for young pregnant mothers.

She was also involved in the Pickens County Heart Association for many years. She planned and hosted very successful Heart Fund Balls for many years. Beverly loved to combine her charitable work with fun.

Beverly was active in Laura's school's PTO. She had been PTO President and was in charge of updating Pickens Middle School including the gym sound system, which had been used up until PMS moved to their new location this school year.

Beverly was also an active member of the Pickens Junior Assembly. In fact, after her death they initiated a scholarship in her memory. The 5K run which is held during the Azalea Festival supports the Beverly M. Smith Memorial scholarship. Many young people have been awarded this scholarship to help with their college expenses as a tribute to Beverly's commitment to education.

This is just a glimpse of our friend Beverly Smith. She was a Christian lady who showed her faith through her actions. Beverly made an impact wherever she went. And she is remembered for her kind spirit and outgoing personality. We are honoring her because of her commitment to and love for this church. Neil shared that he and Beverly grew up as Baptists, but after their marriage found that Mt. Zion United Methodist Church was the perfect fit for their family. Neil expressed how much Beverly loved this church and found a church home in this special church family. We are very blessed to name our group in honor of such an amazing woman.
